
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Photo Title: The New Face of Firefighting

The photos will be showcased in the *Weekly Digest* as well as State Parks' social media channels with their photo credit.

The rules/criteria to submit photos are:

- · Your favorite "Hidden Gem" must be accessible to everyone.
- Photos must be taken between Dec. 21, 2018 through March 11, 2019.
- Photos with images of non-park staff must include a photo Release Form (DPR 993).
- Photos must be taken at one of California's 280 state parks.
- Park employees and volunteers can submit photos.
- Photo will be judged on photo quality/uniqueness/moment captured/content.
- Top five photos will be shared on California State Parks' social media channels and the Weekly Digest.

John has served as the Special Assistant to the Deputy Director of Park Operations since 2015—advising the Deputy Director on all aspects of statewide operations while steering policy development, revenue generation, and working on a variety of key initiatives associated with the Department's transformation effort, such as the Service Based Budgeting effort and the Structural Reorganization Project.

Since 2016, John has also served as the Acting Chief of the Interpretation and Education Division, leading that core program through structural changes, the establishment of new program funds, and the build-out of new and existing district interpretive programs. John helped steer the growth



of the Department's underserved access efforts, the further development of digital education platforms, and the integration of new functions such as the Off-Highway Motor Vehicle and Boating and Waterways outreach and education programs.

John started with California State Parks as a historian within the Cultural Resources Division, where he oversaw statewide funding programs, information management systems and performed historic building assessments and evaluations.

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John holds a BA (History) and MA (History) from California State University, Sacramento. He lives in Elk Grove, California, with his wife, Jennifer, and their three children, Michael, Grant and Abigail.



State Parks Rescue Captured on Camera at Carmel-by-the-Sea

A high-surf advisory was in effect earlier this week from Sonoma County to Monterey County. In Carmel-by-the-Sea, a local resident was taking photos of the big surf when he happened to capture a surf rescue on camera.

While this happened in the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea, which is not part of the State Park System, our state park lifeguards respond to all 911 calls for an aquatic rescue within Monterey District. On Monday, Dec. 17, Seasonal Lifeguard II David Buckalew swam through large dangerous surf to rescue a body surfer. David eventually swam the victim out to a U.S. Coast Guard vessel.

There was a National Weather Service high surf warning and the local monitoring buoy was measuring waves 21 feet high every 19 seconds. State Park Ranger Zach Haney helped from shore by guiding David to the victims, using hand signals. State Park Lifeguard Supervisor James Northhelfer was preparing to launch a rescue water craft, also known as a Personal Water Craft (PWC), but it was not needed.

Once David ensured the victim was safely aboard the Coast Guard's 47-foot motor lifeboat, he swam back to shore through the large surf. CAL FIRE, Carmel Fire and Carmel Police

The Coast Guard boat transported the victim to the nearby Stillwater pier in Pebble Beach. He was evaluated by AMR. The victim was an experienced swimmer and water polo player who had been body surfing at 4th Street without fins when a rip current pulled him away from shore.

Our group worked as a team to safely affect a successful rescue. This is a testament to great training and agencies working together toward a common goal.

Below is the email from the photographer who captured the rescue:

Dear Parks Department,

On Monday, December 17, 2018, my wife and I walked to the local beach, here in Carmel-By-The-Sea, to shoot pictures of the massive ocean swell that hit the California coastline. As we were setting up, we noticed a person running full speed towards the beach break, which was excessively large and ugly looking. Our first thought being it was a belly boarder getting a running start to hit the water, swim out into the takeoff spot and start catching waves.

However, we soon realized it was a rescue operation unfolding right before our camera lenses. After this rescue ended, I told the State Parks employee, who performed the rescue, that I had shot pictures of his rescue and would try and get the them into his possession.

Please forward the following link to him. It was a textbook rescue operation, not only by your employee, but by all those departments involved, and it was his amazing efforts that really moved us. A huge congratulations to him, his training and your department in providing this service.

Note: These photographs were shot with a 300mm telephoto with a 2X converter, so it may look like the people are close to the shore, but in fact were probably 150 yards plus, off the beach.

Special State Parks Peace Officer 40th Anniversary Badge to Commemorate Defensive Tactics Program

California State Parks' defensive tactics program turns 40 next year. To highlight this anniversary, a special State Park Peace Officer Anniversary Badge has been authorized to wear from Jan. 1, 2019 until Dec. 31, 2019, in place of the standard department badge.

Back in 1979, a group of rangers began a search for a defensive tactics program to provide rangers and then lifeguards with the tools needed to meet the challenges and legal requirements of serving as peace officers in California. The group explored a variety of different defensive tactics systems and, in 1984, agreed to use the Pacific Institute of

Defensive Tactics (PIDT) model. The PIDT system has been used to train department officers ever since.

California State Parks staff instructors began this 40th anniversary commemoration at last month's defensive tactics staff instructor refresher, when they took a team photo and presented Rod Sanford with a plaque. Rod is the department's lead defensive tactics

instructor known as *sensei* to the staff. The plaque commemorates his decades-long commitment to the department and this program.

Purchasing the 40th anniversary badge is optional and is at the individual employee's expense. Present and retired state park peace officers (SPPO) can purchase the badge, which is \$95. Those interested can contact SPPO Lifeguard John Anderson at (619) 666-3176 or at John.Anderson@parks.ca.gov.



From our park family to yours, we wish you all the happiest of holidays and a happy, healthy and prosperous New Year!



Office of Historic Preservation Represents at the National Trust Historic Preservation Conference

Office of Historic Preservation (OHP) Senior Restoration Architect Tim Brandt and Restoration Architect Mark Huck were invited to present information about the <u>Federal Historic Preservation Tax Incentives Program</u> at the National Trust for Historic Preservation's (NTHP) annual conference this year in San Francisco.

The <u>Federal Historic Preservation Tax Incentives Program</u> encourages private sector rehabilitation of historic buildings and is one of the nation's most successful and cost-

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applications and is the first point of contact for questions and consultation on the use of the tax incentives.

At the NTHP conference, Tim Brandt, along with National Park Service Senior Historical Architect Antonio Aguilar and Port of San Francisco Historic Preservation Coordinator Mark Paez, participated in a field study session, "Historic Tax Credits in Action at the Embarcadero." The trio outlined their respective roles and responsibilities within the tax program and described the tax credit process during presentations and tours of several historic buildings in the Embarcadero National Register District. Thirty-five conference attendees from across the country participated in the sold-out afternoon walkabout session involving the Ferry Building; Pier One, Piers 1-1/2, 3, and 5; and a special docent-led tour of Pier 15, home of the Exploratorium museum.

Mark Huck participated in the conference's other tax credit field study, "Reuse and Renewal at Fort Baker," which looked at a former military fort's repurposing as Cavallo Point resort and spa. Huck, along with Aguilar, Golden Gate National Recreation Area Project Manager Steve Kasierski, Architectural Resources Group's Debbie Cooper, and General Manager of Cavallo Point's Brendan Carlin, discussed the selection of an appropriate private partnership for the fort. They addressed the challenges of meeting the requirements of both Section 106 review and Federal Tax Credit review. Members of the field study then toured the new spa and resort buildings, the rehabilitated barracks and officers' quarters, and the unique cultural landscape of the former fort.

Office of Historic Preservation Archaeologist Volunteers in Search for Human Cremains for Victims in Paradise

This past weekend, Office of Historic Preservation Archaeologist Anmarie Medin was one of several volunteers who joined a dedicated team of archaeologists and a canine forensics team to search for human cremains among the ashes of the burned city of Paradise. In the rush to escape fast-moving flames, families often must leave behind in their homes the urns containing ashes of loved ones. Alta Archaeological Consulting, and the Institute for Canine Forensics, have been working with families to help locate and recover those ashes. It is painstaking work, but rewarding when a family can be reunited with this precious connection to their loved ones. Cremains recovery was performed following the Santa Rosa area fires of 2017 and is underway now in the wake of the recent Camp, Hill, and Woolsey fires. There is

This year's chili cook-off judge was State Park Ranger Damion Laughlin from Red Rock Canyon State Park. After comprehensive deliberation, first place went to "3rd Alarm Chili," submitted by Los Angeles County Fire Station 114's Jeremy Wright. Homestead cook-off regular Jodi Mulder took second with her "Taco Chili," and Joanna Parker came in third place with her "Mighty Bison Chili." Thanks to our partners, the winners took home a hot sauce set, a \$20 gift certificate for the AVIM gift shop, and a day-use/camping pass for the 11 parks of the Tehachapi District, respectively. Other submissions were State Park Volunteer Alejandra (Ale) Sandoval's vegan chili (which won first place in 2017), a team of her father Juan and sister Lizette with "Thunder Chili," and State Park Ranger Kevin Overduin's "Cattle Wrangler's Trail Chili."

Also available for tasting was Rose Edwards' original 1940's "Texas Style Chili" recipe, made with real suet and lard! In the Museum's early days, Rose's chili was popular at the local community Christmas gatherings. State Park Interpreter Jean Rhyne and District Administrative Chief Patty Plumlee recreated the recipe, which involved special requests for the obscure ingredients at the local Mexican market, and interpreting Rose's sometimesambiguous recipe notes.

Harking back to the creativity and artistry of museum founder H. A. Edwards, the event's craft boutique featured handmade jewelry, whimsical housewares, miniatures, needlework and more from Art Resurrected, Toodeloo Studios, Dark Wolf Jewelry Design, Accent Illusions and Kittyloaf Designs.

Outdoor heat lamps were a new addition at the seating areas this year, and greatly appreciated by the visitors on the particularly chilly night.

Destination Lancaster, one of the biggest promoters of our local State Parks, organized a visit to the event for a group of 20 local and worldwide travel bloggers and tour companies. Interpreter Jean Rhyne hosted a private tour of the historic grounds for the group, in addition to a public tour, which included a rare opportunity to view the inside of historic Lizard Cottage temporarily furnished with the original 1940's Monterey Furniture.

The museum grounds were festively decorated with live greenery and ribbons in the original holiday style of Mr. Edwards. Over the previous week, Interpreter Jean had diligently scavenged four Christmas tree lots on a nightly basis for discarded tree branches, so volunteers could make the fresh-smelling garland, swags and wreaths. The volunteer decorators were often excited to discover they had a new talent!

Just as in the 1940's, the local community still comes together today to support each other in the spirit of the holiday season. To accompany the chili, The Lemon Leaf Café in Lancaster donated trays of delicious cornbread. Karen Freeman from The Feed Store loaned straw bales for seating around the fire, and Moses Medina donated firewood to keep everyone toasty and the kettles hot!


















Museum and visitor's services staff here at the park also send a big THANK YOU to our program docents for providing our 4th-graders with new learning experiences and special memories.


